



## **WORKSHOP ON TOWARDS A NEW VISION FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT: WHAT PLACE FOR DEMOCRATIC GOVERNANCE?**

### Concept note

Governments at the United Nations are currently engaged in consultations on how to reframe the global development agenda in the light of new realities and from the perspective of sustainability. Among other things, they have already agreed to develop a new set of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) that will apply to both developed and developing countries and that will build on the Millennium Development Goals when they expire in 2015.

As part of this process, the IPU is gathering the views of parliamentarians on the overall vision and the specific goals of the new development framework. Recognizing the role of democratic governance as a key enabler of sustainable development, as well as of well-being in general, the IPU is advocating at the United Nations for democratic governance to be included among the new SDGs as a stand-alone goal and/or as a dimension of other goals.

This workshop is intended to help parliamentarians reflect on democratic governance in its key dimensions and applications. It will help fine-tune the IPU position in this arena while also creating a common understanding among Members both of the issue and of the ways and means in which they can help support it.

In the lead-up to the workshop, parliamentarians will be invited to respond to a survey questionnaire that probes their own views on democratic governance. The workshop itself will consist of short introductory presentations on the general topic, a discussion of the results of the parliamentary survey, and small group discussions among participants on specific questions.

The outcome of the workshop will consist of practical inputs for the IPU to feed into the UN-led global consultations. It will also be designed to encourage MPs to supporting democratic governance as part of the new SDGs.

Questions to be discussed will be aimed at:

- Defining the objectives of a possible democratic governance goal that would apply to both developed and developing countries;
- Articulating key elements of participation, accountability and transparency; and
- Fleshing out strategic approaches MPs can utilize in support of the goal.
