Institutional Coordination Mechanism

The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development calls for:

Peaceful, just and inclusive societies that provide equal access to justice and that are based on respect for human rights (including the right to development), on effective rule of law and good governance at all levels, and on transparent, effective and accountable institutions.

It pledges to **tackle** inequality, corruption, poor governance, illicit financial and arms flows, and other factors that give rise to **violence** and **insecurity**.





I. THE 2030 AGENDA & GOVERNANCE



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SDG 16 is the main goal for fostering peaceful, just and inclusive societies which are free from fear and violence.

It embodies **10 targets** and **23 indicators**.



I. THE 2030 AGENDA & GOVERNANCE

Goal 16: Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels

Target 16.1 Significantly reduce all forms of violence and related death rates everywhere

Target 16.2 End abuse, exploitation, trafficking and all forms of violence against and torture of children

Target 16.3 Promote the rule of law at the national and international levels and ensure equal access to justice for all

Target 16.4 By 2030, significantly reduce illicit financial and arms flows, strengthen the recovery and return of stolen assets and combat all forms of organized crime

Target 16.5 Substantially reduce corruption and bribery in all their forms

Target 16.6 Develop effective, accountable and transparent institutions at all levels

Target 16.7 Ensure responsive, inclusive, participatory and representative decision-making at all levels

Target 16.8 Broaden and strengthen the participation of developing countries in the institutions of global governance

Target 16.9 By 2030, provide legal identity for all, including birth registration

Target 16.10 Ensure public access to information and protect fundamental freedoms, in accordance with national legislation and international agreements

Target 16.a Strengthen relevant national institutions, including through international cooperation, for building capacity at all levels, in particular in developing countries, to prevent violence and combat terrorism and crime

Target 16.b Promote and enforce non-discriminatory laws and policies for sustainable development

II. HOW DO WE GET THERE?

ADDRESSING DIFFERENT NEEDS

Whole-Society-Approach to designing coordinated, integrated, and comprehensive fragility analyses to inform all planning processes:

- Improving the legal and policy environment
- Strengthening analytical capability among government actors, private sector and civil society to identify drivers of fragility
- Building early warning and early action infrastructure at all levels of society

These processes also **leverage established mechanisms**, **institutions and processes** that enable citizens to articulate their interests, exercise their legal rights and obligations and mediate their differences to promote cohesive societies.





Equal opportunities offered to Women and Youth to Participate, Design and Decide

It must be ensured that all stakeholders, including political actors, civil society, the private sector and the public at large, are engaged in an **open and inclusive SDG process** in order to build a strong sense of **ownership** and ensure **people-centered** development.

Agenda 2030 explicitly recognizes that **engagement of parliaments is essential for the success of the SDGs**. Parliamentarians have a critical role to play in driving forward people-centered development that is reflective of and responsive to the needs of their constituents.

LOCALIZING THE GOALS

All of the SDGs have targets directly related to the responsibilities of local and regional governments. That is why the achievement of the SDGs depends on the ability of local and regional governments to promote integrated, inclusive and sustainable territorial development.

Subnational governments are policy makers, catalysts of change and the level of government best placed to link the global goals with local communities. Localizing development is then a process to **empower all local stakeholders**, aimed at making sustainable development more responsive, and therefore, relevant to local needs and aspirations.



INCLUSIVE MONITORING AND REPORTING

Considering the enabling nature of SDG16 vis-à-vis the Agenda, meaningful monitoring and reporting on this goal requires a certain level of analysis and **contextualization** for countries to "ground" the global targets in national realities.


- What types of institutional arrangements work best for a broad array of national stakeholders to collaborate effectively around SDG16 monitoring?

INCLUSIVE MONITORING AND REPORTING

Tool: Monitoring to Implement Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions: Pilot Initiative of National-Level Monitoring of SDG 16.

- Collect indicators from National Statistical Offices; international platforms, government administrative data and non-official sources
- Conduct consultations: analytical joint reviews of progress and recommendations in which government and civil society participate
- Produce periodic scorecard tracking results on selected indicators, identifying data monitoring gaps and incorporating specific policy recommendations





The Agenda 2030 also wants parliamentarians to pay special attention to the **parliament's own institutional development** and their own work as representatives of their constituents.




5.6 Develop effective, accountable and transparent institutions at all levels.

Ensure responsive, inclusive, participatory and representative decision-making at all levels.



Parliamentarians have special responsibility to open parliaments and engage the public so government programmes and fiscal policies will **benefit everyone**, including Kareem. For example, they can build a **public dialogue** with people through civil society partnerships, public fora or through social media.





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
The parliament of Georgia did that - They can also promote participatory lawmaking and hold public hearings on draft laws.

Of course, parliaments will need to work on their "Agenda 2030 readiness".

They will require new capacities, sufficient resources, institutional arrangements and internal processes, as well as good coordination and exchange of information with other actors.

Engagement in the Arab region is based on a **Regional Parliamentary SDG Action Plan** that was developed during a **Regional Seminar** in 2017.

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
The Seminar brought together many MPs like Salma to exchange knowledge and expertise on advancing the Agenda 2030.






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
National activities will be complemented with additional support:
