## **GPEDC Senior-Level Meeting** draft outline programme 13-14 July 2019, United Nations Headquarters, New York

Making the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) a reality will not only require a move from billions to trillions but also leveraging the capacities, skills, technology and knowledge of all partners and an improvement in both their quantity *and* quality, as noted in the Addis Ababa Action Agenda for Financing for Development (FfD). It will also require a stronger commitment to making partnership and co-operation more effective and impactful as a 'whole of society' effort.

The globally-agreed effectiveness principles (country ownership, focus on results, inclusive partnerships and transparency and mutual accountability) are instrumental in multiplying the potential of each dollar spent to implement the 2030 Agenda. As such, the effectiveness agenda represents a cornerstone and an essential part of international efforts for sustainable development – closely interlinked with the goals and commitments captured in the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs, Financing for Development, Climate Change, Disaster Risk Reduction and other relevant global agreements and processes.

The UN High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (HLPF) is the main platform for the international review of efforts to achieve the SDGs. In 2019, the HLPF will be convened under the auspices of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) in July, and, for the first time, under the auspices of the General Assembly in September, for an inaugural 'SDG Summit': bringing the review of progress – and gaps –to the very highest levels of government and organisations.

The Senior-Level Meeting (SLM) of the Global Partnership for Effective Development Co-operation (GPEDC) will take place on 13-14 July 2019, with a view to informing the Ministerial Segment of the 2019 United Nations High-Level Political Forum under the auspices of the Economic and Social Council. As its core objective, the SLM will provide an inclusive platform for governments, international organisations, civil society, trade unions, parliaments, local governments, the private sector, foundations and academia to provide the motivation and impetus to make the shift to more effective co-operation that will produce better, faster and more sustained impact across the SDGs and help deliver the revitalised global partnership for sustainable development at the core of the 2030 Agenda. To deliver on this vision in the long run, the specific contribution and the added value of the GPEDC is driven by its inclusive multi-stakeholder approach, as underscored by SDG 17.

The SLM will make tangible contributions to the 2019 HLPF by showcasing how greater collective efforts on effectiveness can accelerate country-level progress on the SDGs under review at the HLPF: SDG 4 (Education), SDG 8 (Decent Work), SDG 10 (Reducing Inequalities), SDG 13 (Climate Change), SDG 16 (Peace, justice, and strong institutions) and particularly to SDG 17 (Global Partnership for Sustainable Development), alongside new country-level data and evidence on SDG 17, and SDG 5 (Gender equality). With this, and by presenting fresh evidence, good practices, new guidelines and tools for effective development co-operation, the SLM will highlight the state-of-play and contribution of development effectiveness as an important lever for accelerating progress towards the 2030 Agenda and encourage concrete action and commitment to effectiveness as a driver of sustainable development.

The GPEDC's Senior-Level Meeting will bring together development actors at a senior level. Formats of sessions will vary, depending on the topic, with the intention of showcasing actions and commitments undertaken by a variety of stakeholders to uphold the effectiveness principles: so that 'all countries, all stakeholders, and all people' can work better together, to achieve the 2030 Agenda.

- Demonstrate how the GPEDC's PSE work can contribute to SDG 8 on effective private sector partnerships to promote job creation and decent work for youth and women.

- Principles and Guidelines for effective private sector engagement through development co-operation.
- Evidence from case studies in <u>Bangladesh</u>, <u>Egypt</u>, <u>El Salvador</u>, and <u>Uganda</u>.
- Statement and recommendations by the GPEDC Business Leaders Caucus.
- Considerations related to PSE provided by emerging economies.
