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What is the Biological Weapons Convention all about?

Prohibits development, production, stockpiling, acquisition, retention or transfer of BWs

- Opened for signature on 10 April 1972
- EiF on 26 March 1975
- · XV Articles
- First multilateral disarmament treaty banning an entire category of WMD
- · Non-discriminatory in nature
- Unlimited duration
- · Open to any state



Why to join the BWC?

- Need to strengthen norm against BWs and make it universal

- Joining BWC will help meeting requirements of SCR 1540
- Sole multilateral forum for dialogue concerning all issues pertaining to BWs



- Promotes peaceful uses of biological S&T
- Benefit from capacity development programmes



Why to join the BWC?

- Offers a consultation and cooperation mechanism
- Builds transparency through CBMs
- Assists States which have been exposed to a danger
- Minimal costs, very limited reporting and admin. resources for implementation


